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Cheers Survey: No. 1 among Enterprises' Most Favored Private Universities for the Twentieth Time

On February 2, Cheers Magazine released the result of its 2017 survey, "Enterprises' Most Favored Universities." Tamkang University occupied the overall No. 9 spot, ranking No. 1 among the private universities for the twentieth time.

Among the top 15 "Graduates' Performance Exceeding Expectations," Tamkang University ranked No. 4 overall, higher than National Taiwan University, and No. 2 among the private universities. According to the survey, graduates' outstanding performance resulted from TKU's adaptability and diversity in designing and developing educational programs.

As indicated by the survey, 72.6 percent of enterprises believed that graduates with "internship experience" would boost chances of getting hired. The second factor was "performance at interview." Also, noticeable in the survey was that up to 60 percent of enterprises desired to seek graduates with "cross-disciplinary professional training." In other words, graduates' understanding of the workplace as well as the nature of jobs

was highly regarded by enterprises. This survey has been conducted for straight twenty-one years, targeting human resource directors of the top 2000 enterprises ranked by CommonWealth Magazine in 2016. Conducted from Nov. 21 to Dec. 23, 2016, the survey collected 840 valid questionnaires, with a response rate of 44.53 percent.

The alumni of the Department of Mass Communication, also marketing director of Deep-Stone Digital Technology, Tsai-ling Duan said, "I feel proud of my alma mater, ranking No. 1. During my college years, I gained internship experience in media during summer break. Not only did I increase my practical experience, but I also took the opportunity to polish my training in the workplace while studying in school. Besides, the courses offered by the Department of Mass Communication encouraged independent thinking and allowed a space for learning communication skills. With this professional training, I didn't need to spend much time resolving conflicts in the workplace and I was equipped with

courage and ability to face and solve problems." (Deng Chiou-Rung)

Ministry of Education Subsidizes Tamkang with 60 Million NT Dollars


The Ministry of Education (MOE) approved 33 universities with subsidies for the purpose of 106th year project expansion. Among which, Tamkang University received 60 million NT dollars, 10 million more than last year and the highest one in Tamkang's history. The statistics showed that Tamkang University has accumulated 500 million NT dollars in subsidiaries from the MOE ever since Teaching Excellence Project.

President Flora Chia-I Chang expressed her gratitude and amazement, saying, "Tamkang highly esteems sustainability in education." MOE committee members were impressed by Tamkang's facilities and enthusiasm in school management, for instance, cozy learning spaces sporadically found on campus. What was more

encouraging was that Tamkang got more subsidies at a time when the MOE is not intended to increase the budget for higher education. On the whole, the MOE review committee clearly stated that Tamkang did a good job in academic research, employment after graduation, leading performance in futurology and other efforts contributed into theories and practices, etc.

Chief Audit Executive Bai Di-qing outlined Tamkang's future blueprint and elaborated, "In response to Teaching Excellence Project of MOE, Tamkang has five perspectives to fulfill: 1. Academic Research 2. Learning Effectiveness 3. Creativity and Transformation 4. Counseling for Students 5. Post-graduation Employment," and besides, "Office of Quality Assurance and Audit

Universiade Weightlifting Trial Run Games Bring the Best Out in Athletes

To prepare for weightlifting at the Universiade, which is an international athletic event for university students, 2017 National Youth Cup Weightlifting Championship and Taipei Universiade Trial Run Games were held in Shaomo Memorial Gymnasium for three days from March 4th. To boost morale, President Flora Chia-I Chang attended and watched the games in person. At the end of the games, together with Taipei Universiade Committee Executive Director Zheng Fang-fan, President Chang awarded 16 gold medals to excellent athletes.

Prior to the opening ceremony, male weightlifting of 56kg and 62kg weight classes were held and Olympian Tang Qi-zhong carried off the championship with 105kg snatch, 135kg clean & jerk and total 240kg. On the first day of the games, six gold medals were awarded. In the last game, Luo Ga-zhi, Cheng Shiu University, carried off the gold medal with 150kg snatch, 185kg clean & jerk and total 335kg. He said inspiringly, "Even the smallest improvement encourages me to keep going."

The long-expected finale debut was Chen Shi-jie, an Olympian. Even though he had failed in challenging the national record, Chen carried off the gold medal of 105 kg weight class with 190 kg snatch, 240 kg clean & jerk and total 430 kg. After the game, he expressed his hope and said, "I am

looking forward to the championship in the Universiade." Dean of Physical Education Xiao Shu-fen elaborated the efforts in the trial games and said, "The games follow the exact official standards in lighting, control, services, filming, photography and awards ceremony in the hope of bringing out the best in athletes. Subsidizing Advanced Professional Courses and Capstone Courses

The Curriculum Section of the Office of Academic Affairs released the list of subsidized courses, including ten advanced professional courses, plus one workshop, and 6 capstone courses. The director of the Curriculum Section, Jen-chu Tsai stated, "Starting with this semester, our school will offer capstone courses, helping students integrate and apply their learning. Before students graduate, these courses will help students evaluate their learning effectiveness. Also, following our school's plan for future development, all the departments and programs will offer advanced professional courses to promote students' professionalism."

According to TKU's "Regulations for Capstone Course Subsidy," the capstone courses, including

two courses offered by the College of Liberal Arts and four by the College of Engineering, will get a maximum subsidy of 40,000 TWD. Associate Professor Jenmu Wang of the Department of Civil Engineering, offering the course "Computer-Aided Engineering Technology and Exercise" this semester, said, "Taiwan's higher education puts more and more emphasis on 'output' and students' 'learning outcomes.' Adjusting teching styles and materials, capstone courses help students integrate their learning. This time we have nine teachers joining this class and students can choose to take part in one of the teachers' projects. Divided into different groups and focusing on practice, students will be able to explore, present, debate, and solve real but complicated engineering



Survey: Graduates Have a Positive View on Faculty's Professionalism

The results of the two surveys, "2014 Graduates' Satisfaction and Job Placement" and "2012 Tracking Graduate Careers Three Years after Graduation," were released. On the noon of February 22, the Office of Alumni Service and Resources Development gave a presentation on the surveys in Ching-Shen International Conference Hall and shared their experience of collecting graduates' information.

The response rate of "2014 Graduates" Satisfaction and Job Placement " was 64.6%, and according to the survey, 55.8% of those who graduated in 2015 got a job. Among those graduates in the workplace, 56.3% confirm that professionalism that they acquired meets the requirements for

alma mater, the six-point scale survey revealed that the top three responses with the highest scores were as follows, "I feel proud of alma mater" with 4.73, "I am willing to give back to alma mater when I make achievements in the future" with 4.66, and "I am willing to

recommend relatives and friends to study in Tamkang University" with 4.54.

With regard to teaching faculty, the following three responses received the highest scores, "faculty's professionalism" with 4.52, "teachers' respecting students' opinions" with 4.04, and "interaction between teachers and students" with 3.77, all higher than those in the previous survey. Also, graduates confirm that eight essential qualities our school's education aims to cultivate in students benefit their career development. In particular, "a spirit of teamwork and dedication" was scored 4.32, "independent thinking" 4.29, and "moral integrity" 4.01. The Chief Executive of the Office of Alumni Service and Resources Development, Chun-young Perng explained that the eight essential

qualities have been the guideline for our school's education, aiming About how alumni regards to cultivate professionalism as well as team spirit in students. In addition, "The completion of the Shou-Chien International Conference Hall will increase our school's international exposure, promote TKU's reputation, and encourage the enrollment of prospective students."
