Japanese Language Assisted by Artificial Intelligence

Assistant Professor Ling Ye of the Japanese Department, advanced her argument, saying, "There should be a balance stricken between modernity and the needs of students. Zhao took crowdfunding as an opportunity into the new market. She was aware and conscious of the details in marketing and promotion. She advanced her idea, saying, "We cannot tag a price and push the product onto consumers and hope they buy it. In addition, literary thematic salons and films were scheduled. The opening ceremony took place at 1:30 pm on April 30, with President Dr. Huan-Chao Keh; Dean of the Library, Prof. Sheue-Fang Song; and Dean of Foreign Languages and Literatures College, Prof. Wan-Bao Wu, invited to attend. Students from the French Department also recited French poems.

Chiu-Hsia Shih, Chief of Circulation Section, stated, "France has been famous for its cultural richness. In several literary works, the depiction of urban landscape and lifestyle fascinates readers and appeals to tourists, indulging themselves in the atmosphere of the cities. These cities have nourished the creativity of writers and artists and some literary anecdotes get passed through

generations for people to relish. We hope that people can acquire a better understanding of French literature through this reading event. All TKU students and faculty are invited to join."

The event was launched with "Thematic Collection" categorized into "The Guidance for Book Fans: Portraits of French authors and Classics," "Literature on the Dining Table: Gourmet Relationship between Cuisine and Literature," "Urban Literature: French Lifestyle," and "Fairy Tales: Imagination and Realism." In Literary Salons, the owner of Café Madeleine Pin-Hway Chou; Prof. Chien-Wen Tsai from the Graduate Institute of Food Culture and Innovation, National Kaohsiung University of Hospitality and Tourism; Prof. His-Deh Wu from the French Department, Tamkang University; and Prof. Yao-Chueh Juan from the Department of European Languages and Literatures, National Chengchi University, were invited to join the discussion.

Kaleidoscope of International Cultures, Six Students Sharing Their Overseas Experience

International and Mainland Students Guidance Section held the activity "Kaleidoscope of International Cultures" in the lounge on the 10th floor of Ching-Sheng Memorial Hall from 6 to 8 o'clock every Wednesday evening from March 13 to May 29. Attracting an audience of over 30 people to participate in the event, the first among the 10 sections took place on the evening of March 13, with six students, including junior student Tien-Ze Jia, graduate students Zhong-Wen Lin, Yu-Ying Wu, Zi-Qiao Chen from the French Department, and senior students Xiao-Hui Zhong and Zi-Yu Yuan from the Department of Industrial Economics, sharing their overseas experience.

Xiao-Hui Zhong and Zi-Yu Yuan focused on "the first step to achieve the goal" in their sharing of study and internship as an exchange student in Tsinghua University. In addition to presenting the campus and activities, Zhong and Yuan also introduced the local idioms, "sour vegie fish' describes a person as being sour and poor, also a 'salty fish,' referring to a person who has no strength at all. Another popular idiom, 'retreat once discovering all males,' (derived from

the original 4-character Chinese idiom, 'retreat once discovering difficulties' as 'males' in Chinese sounds similar to 'difficulties' in Chinese) is a helpful suggestion that one should retreat when discovering participants in some school activity are all males because the university's student sex ratio is male 70% and female 30%. Zhong and Yuan encouraged the audience and offered suggestions with regard to overseas studies.

Tien-Ze Jia not only shared what he learned "as an outsider" while visiting such cities as Shanghai, Taipei, Hong Kong, Macao, and Singapore, but he also analyzed different cultures, lifestyles and consumption. He said, "It is important to be open-minded and keep a tolerant attitude while traveling in a city or a foreign county. Dropping one's emotions and existing impressions, one could gain more."

Zhong-Wen Lin, Yu-Ying Wu, and Zi-Qiao Chen shared what they had seen and heard during their "internship at Avignon Festival." For instance, their leisure activity was going to the theatre and interviewing the audience after the performance. It was fun to see the hilarious parade

Focus on People: Wen-Hsin Lin, Sophomore from Department of International Business, Volunteering in Cambodia and Bringing Love Home

interview was approaching, the boy greeted me with a bashful smile. He was Wen-Hsin Lin, a sophomore student from the Department of International Business. The fact that he is a Cambodian was

beyond imagination, for he could speak fluent Chinese. This winter break, he joined volunteer work in Cambodia, which, as he reflected, "allowed me to grow and make changes in my life. With this experience, I determine to continue with volunteer work, to give back to my hometown."

Since Wen-Hsin Lin has relatives residing in Mainland China, he learned Chinese as a child. Though he originally planned to study in China for his college education, fearing that he might be burden to his relatives, he eventually came to Taiwan all by himself. New in Taiwan, every time he came across problems, he would turn to International and Mainland Students Guidance Section and ask Section Chief, Mei-Lan Lee, for help. With this connection, he helped with the translation of Khmer language and was invited to join the volunteer work in Cambodia. "In the beginning, I hesitated because I never had any experience of volunteering. Then I thought I should challenge myself. I could return home for New Year celebration as well."

The first time he joined the volunteer work, he felt quite nervous about training, preparing lessons and offering guidance. "I used to be a little sloppy. After I found my lesson plans inferior to others, I became active and revised my lesson plans. I got a lot of help from my team and they encouraged

me a lot." Upon arrival in Cambodia, Wen-Hsin Lin took charge of Chinese teaching. Those children who came to class were younger than expected, so Lin had to slow down in teaching and repeat what he taught many times. He also found that the parents of those children were busy working, and even one of the children had to bring her younger sister with her to class. "Well, the kid was diligent, but her sister often cried in class and interrupted the lesson, so the translator thought of asking the kid not to bring her sister. But I told the translator not to drive her sister away; instead, we could use a different way, like offering her candy to catch her attention and get her to join us in the lesson attentively!"

Wen-Hsin Lin admitted that he had a bad temper before joining the volunteer work. With a laugh, he said, "I thought I would lose my temper. But it turned out that every student was well-behaved and hardworking. They also came to me and told me something in secret, which gradually transformed my bad temper." The adviser of the Volunteer Work in Cambodia, Yen-Chun Liu, mentioned, "Wen-Hsin used to be very shy, but after getting familiar with other team members, he became outgoing. In the process of preparing, he tended to get anxious and confused while coming across something unfamiliar, but slowly he became more patient and adjusted himself. Indeed, the spirit of teamwork gradually emerged."

What touched Wen-Hsin Lin the most was the moment when it was time to leave Cambodia and a little girl hugged him, asking if he could come again next time. He held back tears, as the adviser's words came to his mind, "We are just temporary visitors, so do not show too much emotion." Still, seeing the little girl hugging other members, everyone could help shedding tears, and Wen-Hsin Lin was no exception. He told himself, "I have to improve and strengthen myself so that I can offer more help to those kids."

Wen-Hsin Lin decided to join the volunteer work in Cambodia again this summer break. He hopes that he can refine his lesson plans and make his teaching more effective. He said, "As long as there is an opportunity, I will try my best to give back and contribute to Cambodia my skills and knowledge." (Chiou-Rung Deng)
